Councillor Mel Beynon retired from the Parish Council in July having served for 40 years.

During this time, Mel was a stalwart for civic duty playing her part to improve the Village, respond to residents' concerns and lead specific areas of work. Mel had a vision to involve the Village youth in local democracy and was instrumental



in establishing the West Horsley Youth Council 8 years ago. Supported quietly, but most ably by her husband Rhys, she spearheaded "West Horsley in Bloom" for 15 years, initiated the Teddy Bears Picnic and was responsible for the Village Litter Picks.

Mel, whose passion for wildlife and gardens, made certain the Village Orchard was accessible to all and introduced the Orchard Guardians to keep a watchful eye over it.

She led the Community Events Task Group for many years and was active on the Roads and Assets TGs ensuring there were benches for people to sit on and bins for rubbish – in timber of course to keep the natural feel – and represented the PC on the Friends of Horsey Station and the Climate Change Action Network. Wherever a need arose, Mel was there to help problem solve.

A true civic servant whom we miss greatly but after such long service, time to shred the agenda papers and leave the emails behind! Thank you, Mel.

NEW COUNCILLOR CHARLIE WALKER

Charlie has been a resident of West Horsley for the past 18 years, where he and his wife have raised their three children, all of whom attended local schools. LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

AFTER 50 YEARS, IT'S ALL CHANGE...

The Government's decision to proceed with two new unitary authorities means Surrey County and 11 District and Borough Councils will be abolished. Their reasoning for the change is to: simplify local government, strengthen local decision-making, improve financial sustainability, accelerate housing delivery and improve co-ordination of public services. Abolition will be on 1st April 2027 with the shadow authorities for East and West Surrey created following all-out elections in May 2026. The new Unitaries will assume full powers on 1st April 2027.

All this means, as a parish council, we will continue intact but expect to strengthen our role in community engagement and representation. We will work with the Joint Committee and Implementation Team for West Surrey and seek to obtain those assets currently owned by either

SCC or GBC that are important to the Village. Our own elections are due in May 2027.

We share residents' concerns about the implications over the level of debt reported in Woking and Spelthorne and the potential consequences this may have for our own Council tax. To date, the Government has confirmed a '£500m in-principle' debt repayment support for Woking Borough Council during 2026/27.

We will hold another Community Forum in the Village Hall once we understand more about the implications, expectations, timetable and consequences. This will be in the New Year before Easter.

S106-PAYMENTS FROM DEVELOPERS

Via GBC we receive monies from developers once a significant proportion of their development is completed or occupied. Such monies are to support the impact of development on the local community. Whilst we still await monies from Manorwood, we have received them from Oakland Farm and this has contributed towards the boiler replacement at the Village Hall. We have applied for monies from the proposed developments at Waterloo Farm and Glenview.

ASSETS & APPEARANCE TASK GROUP

Village Appearance

Our village warden Steve Peach is doing a great job in keeping our village neat and tidy throughout the year. Assets

We are aware of an alarming increase in anti-social behaviour and are urgently looking at measures to protect the Village's principal assets, notably the tennis court. We are privileged to live in a peaceful and beautiful Village with respectful residents but if you do witness any anti-social behaviour please report it to the relevant authorities immediately, either by using www.crimestoppers-uk.org or by dialling 999 or 101.

Elsewhere, we are in the process of updating the Millennium Point viewing platform and plaque now that the view has been enhanced by careful tree pruning, and our thanks must go to the Surrey Countryside Team for their considerable assistance.

PLANNING COMMITTEE

The West Horsley Neighbourhood Plan (NP), which helps shape and protect our village's future, is to be reviewed to ensure it is fit for purpose. The first step is to undertake a housing needs assessment which will be in January 2026. This is an ideal opportunity for you to have your say on the future of West Horsley. We encourage residents to complete the survey so that the review of the NP reflects the views of those who are fortunate to call West Horsley their home. The government continues to review the planning process and policies. This has raised many challenges in considering planning applications (44 from April to October 2025), especially the concept of Grey Belt land.

ROAD SAFETY & MAINTENANCE TASK GROUP

In response to residents who have recently expressed concern over the speed of traffic through West Horsley, the Parish Council arranged for a traffic speed survey to be carried out for a week in November. The data collected will be used to consider safety for both motorists and pedestrians. The pavement along The Street from Cranmore Lane to Walnut Tree Close is due to be repaired/resurfaced in March 2026. The Parish Council continues to actively engage with SCC Highways, East Horsley PC, County Cllr Booth and Borough Cllr Young in considering road related projects across both villages and, where possible, minimising the impact on our residents.

GRACE AND FLAVOUR 2025 (HORSLEY'S COMMUNITY KITCHEN GARDEN)

Growing vegetables in the summer of 2025, the driest we have experienced, has been challenging. Our water supply is not designed to cope with this extreme of climate.



It would have been much easier if we had only planted vegetables that grow well in a Mediterranean Climate. Tomatoes, peppers and aubergines have thrived outdoors. Sun loving crops such as squash, beans and sweetcorn (we defeated the badgers) have been excellent. However, the summer brassicas such as calabrese (broccoli) have struggled.

A big bonus was our fruit crop, which has been magnificent. (We have 75 fruit trees, mainly fan trained or espaliered.) The plums and gages, which have often been decimated by late frosts, were exceptional. Pears, apples and quinces have been superb.

Our NGS (National Garden Scheme) Open Day was a highlight, with over 200 visitors raising money for both the NGS and Cherry Trees.

Another highlight was the renovation of the bridge over the pond in our wildlife area, thanks to a grant from the Horsleys Community Fund.

WEST HORSLEY In Bloom 2025

Over the past two years, judging days for West Horsley in Bloom have presented the judges with totally opposite challenges weather-wise (too hot, too cold!), but this year the conditions were just right.

They were joined by two new judges, Sara Cain and Chris Nairn, who were a great addition to the judging panel along with Ann Masset, Sarah Christiansen and Heather Mason. An official photographer, Rex Butcher, joined the team as well this year and patiently accompanied them while 53 entries throughout the village were being judged over two mornings. The photos were displayed at the Presentation evening which took place on 27th June in the Village Hall so that everyone could appreciate the wonderfully impressive gardens.

The Worshipful the Mayor of Guildford, Councillor Howard Smith and his daughter, Audrey, were in attendance as well as WHPC Chairman Elaine Best, members of the Parish Council and all the competition entrants and their guests. Everyone was welcomed with drinks and canapes which were followed by presentations of the award certificates, prizes and cups to the entrants for all their hard work and outstanding efforts. Celia Chapman who

organises the Children's competition 'Potato in a Pot', presented a cup to this year's winner, Devon Hypher-Thomas for growing the heaviest potato.

A decision was made to include Horsley Station in this year's competition as it celebrated 140 years since the railway opened and began serving the residents of West and East Horsley. The judges enjoyed meeting with the 'Friends of Horsley Station', a group of volunteers who have enhanced the appearance of the station with the introduction of various planters and areas of grass and flowers specially cultivated to encourage wildlife.

VILLAGE ASSETS

WEST HORSLEY VILLAGE HALL

The Village Hall is in the heart of West Horsley, located at the junction of The Street and Silkmore Lane. It is a wonderful community asset available to all residents. The original part was built in 1924 and now has 3 rooms available for hire, including 2 well-stocked modern kitchens as well as free Wi-fi (super-fast, fibre broadband). It has free parking for hirers and there is a large, enclosed children's playground, designed for younger children to the side of the building. Many of you will be already aware of the West Horsley Village Hall and the various activities which take place there but those who are newer to the village may not be, so please spread the word! GOODHART RENDEL COMMUNITY HALL

This is a beautifully refurbished venue that reopened in 2023 as a vibrant hub for local events, gatherings and celebrations. The history of the hall goes back to WW2 and the gift of the premises (the old NAFFI) from the Canadian Government who had allied troops billeted locally. This history is maintained today as the Goodhart Rendel Charity (owners of the hall) are involved in the support of veterans and military projects. The Hall is rooted in the community spirit and is the perfect place to bring people together. Open on Thursday, Friday at 7pm and Saturdays at 5pm run by local volunteers for local people, the Hall as well as having a bar, pool, snooker and darts – now has a flourishing schedule of events with Quiz and music nights (always sold out!) – and with Christmas just around the corner wreath making classes are always popular. By the time this article will be read Halloween will have come and gone and somewhere in the region of 50 local children will have attended pumpkin decorating classes over half term.
