The quilting, needlework and painting are exquisite; the whole restoration of the room is beautifully done. As a Parish Council we were delighted to fund the project. Do visit, it's well worth it.

FINANCE

This is the time of year when budget setting for the following financial year takes place, the other committees and task groups of the Council being asked for an estimate of their requirements for 2024/25. This can be difficult as there are always unexpected costs, the Wisley Appeal for example. Although the Council had the foresight to keep unused funds of about £9,000 from the previous unsuccessful appeal by Wisley Investment Properties to one side so the cost to this year's precept is not as high as it might otherwise have been. The 2024/25 draft budget is due to be approved at the 12th of December 2023 Council meeting prior to being submitted to Guildford. ASSET & APPEARANCE

Things are happening in the Village, with the advent of the 2 new VAS signs to monitor speeding vehicles in The Street, and the new 'West Horsley' ironwork village sign which is to be installed on the Village Green. We are particularly proud of the latter, as we feel it is something that has been lacking in our Village for a while, particularly when compared to surrounding villages in the

Surrey Hills. Elsewhere the Orchard is now looking spectacular, and we are looking into the possibility of installing low level and dark sky compliant floodlighting on the tennis court. A constant problem at this time of year is hedges which block the pavement and drains which need clearing so please look out for any problems and be a good neighbour if your property is relevant. Our Village Warden Steve Peach is doing a great job keeping the village neat and tidy so please let us know if you feel anything needs urgent attention.

ROAD SAFETY & MAINTENANCE

Our village seems to have had more than its fair share of roadworks of late, exacerbated by the A3/M25 works and traffic diversions, but we are pleased to report some positive outcomes following many of these frustrating road closures. Significant drainage improvements were installed at The Street, a location which suffers annual flooding and road closures. Recent storms have certainly put it to the test! The new drainage carried the surface water away far more efficiently than in previous years and, although there was temporary flooding one morning, it had cleared within 20 minutes. We are talking to Surrey CC about the possibility of additional drainage capacity closer to the railway bridge and will continue to monitor the situation. However, we are pleased that initial indicators are looking positive, and hopeful that the days of road closures and flooding at this location are over! West Horsley Youth Council



Despite the interruption from revision and in some cases exams, the Youth Council continues to meet regularly and is growing in confidence. A recent "brainstorming session" between the normal meetings has resulted in new and improved campaigns.

The Youth Council may be small, but we are stronger than ever with a new member, Felicity, joining us in October. We have recently refreshed our noticeboard on East Lane; it is now an eye-catching lime green which stands out very visibly.

HORSLEY MEDICAL PRACTICE

We will be starting a new joint venture with our PCN (Primary Care Network) on a Thursday morning at East Horsley Village Hall. It is a leg ulcer club called 'Legs Get Together' where practice nurses, tissue viability nurses and other Health Care Professionals will be available to dress and look after patients with leg ulcers. As well as clinical help, it will also provide a social setting for people to chat with a cup of tea and cake. We held a very successful well attended Men's Health evening at the end of September. The feedback forms were all extremely positive. As a practice we plan to hold similar events in the 2024 on different health issues. We are also in the process of looking into arranging an Open Day for anyone who is interested in how the practice is run and what goes on behind the scenes! For more information, please keep a look out on the practice website. In the meantime, we are getting a high number of DNA's (Patients who do not attend their appointments and have not cancelled). ROADS MAINTENANCEAROUND WEST HORSLEY

We have been working hard to secure funds for major repairs to the pavements in Northcote Crescent and the results are a huge improvement. The pavements are now even, wide, and safe to walk on. Hedges and tree stumps that encroached on the footway have been removed or cut back. We also pushed for works to repair pavements in Mount Pleasant, where the surface was dangerously uneven. As well as our highways, the village's network of footpaths and bridleways need maintaining. Our Councillors have identified those that need resurfacing, vegetation cutting back or replacement signage and will work with Surrey's Countryside Access team to ensure these works are delivered. There is still much to do, and the team are already working to secure future funding for other areas requiring attention.

ROAD SAFETY AROUND WEST HORSLEY

The Parish Council have ordered 2 new VAS (vehicle activated signs) to replace the existing 2, located opposite the Village Hall and at the junction of the Street and Cranmore Lane, which are old stock and outdated having been gifted to us by Guildford Borough Council a few years ago when they replaced theirs. The new signs will have 'smiley faces and speed indicators to alert drivers travelling along The Street as to what their speed is and remind them that (at present) it's a 30mph speed limit. Whilst it will not completely deter drivers from speeding altogether the brighter displays will be more noticeable, and also have the benefit of allowing us to collect data on when a vehicle is speeding - at any time of day or night - and the speed at which they are travelling, which is useful evidence to send to the police and Surrey County Council.

WEST HORSLEY PLACE RESEARCHING WORLD WAR II

West Horsley Place Trust have teamed up with Royal Holloway to learn more about the history of the manor house. The Bamber Gascoigne Bursary gives a student on the history programme the chance to come to West Horsley to undertake research.

It will both add to the Trust's knowledge and help a student on their first steps into a heritage career. Hannah, the first student to receive this new bursary, chose to look at the 1940s and in the process has uncovered some incredible things!

One astonishing fact was just how close West Horsley Place came to being destroyed by a bomb. West Horsley, as a reception area for evacuees, was considered to be relatively safe and Anderson shelters, the shed-like corrugated iron shelters, were not provided to the people in the village.

However, at the end of November 1940, four bombs fell very close to the house. Hannah

uncovered a document sent from Messenger and Morgan – a land agent – to the Marchioness of Crewe. They wrote to inform her that a bomb had fallen right next to the house on 30 November 1940 and that it has caused a crater and damage to the greenhouses, saying "it is a miracle that no damage was done to the house".

They included a hand drawn map to show her the location. While doing her research Hannah said: "If those four bombs had dropped a second sooner, the house would have been destroyed.

It's alarming to think that the house, as it stands today, could have been blown to pieces. Its history, its contents and the stories hidden in its archive may have been lost entirely. "Luckily the house survived in 1940 and the West Horsley Place Trust are now hoping to conserve it for future generations.

We've held two Community Forums so far. Our first concerned Education. It focused on the concerns that some local children were not able to get

places at the Raleigh and also how the new housing could affect local education generally.

The second again concerned the impact of new housing this time upon the health services that we depend upon. Both provided answers and some new questions as well. Both, we felt, were informative and well received. We're happy to hold more, but obviously only if they could be useful. The Horsleys Community Bus Association was founded as a charity around 25 years ago, having inherited an under-utilised minibus from Surrey County Council on the understanding that the charity would use it to provide community transport in the Horsley area. 5 or 6 minibuses later, today's 'bus' is comfortable and designed for easy access enabling the elderly to get out and go shopping, whilst socialising with friends en-route. Having a lift for disabled passengers, it also takes residents from 3 local care homes on countryside outings and café trips as well as providing regular transport for local social groups & organisations.

CHORAL SOCIETY CHRISTMAS CONCERT


- 'COME & ADORE'

conducting similar services for over twenty years to people residing in the parishes of West and East Horsley.



We also offer a sitting service to give care providers a break and provide company to people living on their own. In addition, we give information about other local services available where appropriate. We are an independent charity, managed and supported solely by volunteers.

PLANNING MATTERS

A STORY ABOUT A GLIMPSE INTO THE FUTURE THE REALITY OF LIFE IN WISLEY NEW TOWN?



Mr and Mrs Average are very excited by the prospect of the new Wisley development and put down an early deposit to secure one of the best houses. They are moving to Taylor Wimpey's new town, and TW's brochure advertises "excellent schools in the vicinity" (which there are) and local shops in the nearby villages, as well as an on-site convenience store. A "medical facility" is also advertised, with the promise of a primary school "in due course", and TW assures them that by the time the development is open, everything will be in place. Mr Average works in London and commutes four days a week and has to be at work at 8.30am every day, entailing a train journey that starts at 7am. Mrs Average works

part-time in a care home. They have two young children, one needing a secondary school, one a private education or private health and have to rely on state-funded facilities. They can't wait to start their new life in the country. However, when they move into their recently completed house in 2027, as one of the first occupants, the first thing they find out is that the 700 houses built in the area in the interim have taken up all the spare capacity from an already overloaded infrastructure. The local primary schools have a two-year waiting list (there is in fact only one, the Raleigh School in West Horsley) and finding a

primary school, and a pet dog. They cannot afford place at a local secondary school is an even bigger

problem. So, Mrs Average has to drive to Woking and back – twice a day, a round trip of over an hour until the on-site primary school is up and running. The local medical centres can't take any more NHS patients, and there is no room at either the local dentists or vets. The convenience shop in the new town lies empty as the retailers won't open until it becomes economically viable, i.e., until about 500 new homes have been sold, and there is still no sign of the 'medical facility'. Mrs Average can't find anywhere to park in either East Horsley or Ripley for local shopping so has to go to Guildford or Cobham. TW gives assurance that on-site facilities will be opened 'in due course'.

However, Taylor Wimpey has a welldocumented history of only providing these facilities at the latest possible opportunity, and sometimes not at all. TW like most developers are not philanthropists and are purely motivated by greed and profit, at whatever cost. They will only build the social facilities (that don't make them money) at the last possible moment in their development programme.

In terms of commuting, there are no extra car parking spaces at either Horsley or Effingham Junction stations. Mr Average is a reluctant average cyclist and doesn't want to risk his life - 40 per cent of the year he will be cycling in the dark - among fast-moving traffic using Ockham Road or Old Lane which is just too dangerous. His only realistic option for cycling to get to Horsley station is via the Long Reach route, a circuitous journey with about 30 chicanes, subsidence, and numerous potholes which takes him over 25 minutes each way and involves crossing three major roads, as well as using a narrow footpath by the woods. His only other option for commuting is to rely on the WACT bus, which is infrequent and unreliable and doesn't make provision for travel outside peak hours. So inevitably Mrs Average will have to drive him to one of the stations and pick him up in the evenings, entailing four journeys every day along either Ockham Road or Old Lane before she takes the children to their respective schools. What will they do when all 2,100 new homes are built and there are likely 4,000 new residents all in the same boat? Tony Rogers

Holly Tree

Traditionally, the Holly tree is highly sacred in Celtic mythology and symbolises peace and

goodwill. Due to its resistance to lightning, it is associated with the Celtic and Norse gods of thunder, Taranis, and Thor, and so was planted near dwellings to protect people from lightning strikes.

Druids believed the Holly tree to possess protective qualities, such as guarding against evil spirits and bad luck. Legend has it that bringing the leaves inside during the winter months would provide shelter from the cold for fairies, who in return would be kind to those who lived in the I

In reality, the Holly tree's abundance of spiked leaves is a great spot for garden birds to safely make their nests, providing a natural protection from predators. These trees are also particularly wonderful in spring, as the delicate, scented flowers are

loved by bees and butterflies. Did you know that a Holly tree is either male or female, this becomes apparent as the tree matures; the male Holly tree has pale yellow flowers and the females are white! Only female trees produce berries, known as drupes.

An old wives tale warns that when the berries are plentiful (like they are this year!) the winter will be very cold. Lets hope is not too cold! Wrap up warm and enjoy the Holiday Season spotting the holly trees around the village.
