Welcome to our 2024 Winter Newsletter

The clocks have gone back, evenings drawing in and with Christmas hurtling towards us, I have looked back on 2024. A busy time, yes, with notable highlights. Firstly, a welcome to two new Parish Councillors in Stephen Skinner and Lucy Moodie; both bring new dimensions to the Council with their respective professional expertise and knowledge. A special thank you to SCC Councillor Dennis Booth for funding vegetation clearance on our pavements, and for helping us to get blocked drains and culverts cleared, easing some flooding problems. His generous allocation from 'Your Fund Surrey' has enabled us to replace the fencing around the playground at the Village Hall, with additional funding coming from the Frazer Strong Trust.

Standing out though, is the impressive work of our Youth Council. A special feature about them follows but from my perspective their commitment to engagement, organizational abilities and life-skills development are a credit to each of them. Five years ago, the Parish Council set about establishing a YC to bring young people into the realms of local democracy; we are so proud of all they are doing.

In October at a special service to dedicate the Covid Memorial Windows, St Martin's Church presented the Parish Council with an oak tree gifted to the people of West Horsley to honour the community spirit of the Horsleys through the Covid-19 pandemic. This tree has been planted at West Horsley Place in the field opposite the Barn for residents to see and enjoy.

Throughout this newsletter, there are examples of what we have been doing and plan for next year so it leaves me to say a huge thank you to our two Clerks, Julia and Karen, fellow Parish, Surrey and Borough Councillors, Village

STRATEGY AND VISION

Early each Autumn, we review our three-year strategic plan and current in-year performance. I am pleased to report that much of what we set out to do has been achieved. This means we are able to set new priorities and objectives as well as keeping up pressure to have our infrastructure addressed as a consequence of major housing development and ensuring we continue to maintain our village appearance and assets. This next period we aim to prioritise biodiversity, resilience, and well-being. Parish Councils have a duty to promote and maintain improved biodiversity opportunities within its sphere and so we will be establishing a specific Task Group to lead on this. Resilience plans are required to be prepared for major incidents and natural disaster events. We will be working with neighbouring Parish Councils and the Flood Forum to produce such a plan that covers the village. Our third area, well-being, is being led by Cllr Clare Clinton and our two new Councillors, Stephen, and Lucy firstly to determine what it is that would be most helpful to alleviate loneliness, isolation, and stress in our young people at school examination times. We welcome views and comments from residents on how the Parish Council should move forward on these.

COMMUNICATIONS TASK GROUP

The Parish Council invited a number of local groups to join a talk by Dave Blake from Kapasun, on safeguarding children in and around Surrey. Dave was able to provide excellent guidance and training, as well as advice on the varying support networks available. FINANCE COMMITTEE

This is budget setting season for the Parish Council, much like the Chancellor, although in hundreds rather than billions! Each Committee and Task Group of the Council is asked how much they envisage spending in the following financial year and, having collated all the figures, and added in the administration costs such as salaries etc., there is a total 'wish list' This is then compared to the current year's precept to see the prospective increase. However, it is acknowledged that residents would not want an excessive increase, so requests are pared down so that the Council still provides its statutory and expected services while being sensitive to the fact that it is taxpayers' money that is being expended. It should be noted that the percentage increase in the precept is not the same as the percentage increase (or possibly decrease) that is shown on Council Tax bills as that figure is based on the calculated number of 'Band D' households in the Parish, over which the Parish Council has no control.

ROAD SAFETY & MAINTENANCE TASK GROUP

The Roads Task Group concentrate on keeping our village's roads, pavements and drains safe and well maintained. Any concerns or problems are reported to the relevant organisations including SCC, GBC, Affinity Water, Thames Water and the Environment Agency. This covers a wide range from reporting potholes to ensuring pavements are clear from obstructions to keeping drainage ditches flowing. The current priority is to repair/re-surface the pavement and kerbstones along The Street from School Lane to Walnut Tree Gardens. The pavement is in a poor, deteriorating condition with broken kerbstones. County Cllr Booth has visited the site and is supporting the Parish Council to secure funding for this work.

Should you notice a pothole or pavement issues please report it thank you.

The Village seems to look its best in Autumn, but we would ask residents to dispose of their fallen leaves responsibly rather than just pushing them onto the road, which inevitably leads to blocked drains. Many thanks to the volunteers who made the litter pick such a success, it really does have a significant effect on keeping our Village neat and tidy. Our Village warden Steve Peach is doing a great job in looking after our assets so well, but please get in touch if you feel something needs urgent attention.

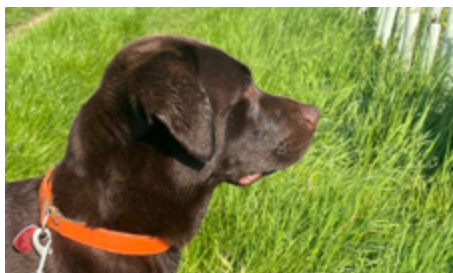
KEEPING OUR VILLAGE MOVING

Details of roadworks and closures in and around our village are posted on the Parish Council website (Roads & Travel Updates - West Horsley Parish Council) to help residents plan their journeys. We try to verify the information from two different sources and provide updates where possible. This has recently been quite challenging as the ongoing road works to the M25 Junction 10/A3 gyratory is having a major impact on our local road network. Details of the current roadworks/closures and diversion routes for this major National Highways scheme can be found at: M25 junction 10 - National Highways
The work is due to be completed in Summer 2025 and will have cost £317 million.

WINTER MAINTENANCE IN THE VILLAGE

It's that time of the year when we ask if residents can carry out garden maintenance to help keep our village looking tidy and keep our roads and pavements as clear as possible by:

- **Fallen Leaves:** if you use a leaf blower, can we please ask that leaves are not blown onto the road as this can block drains or onto pavements as this can create a slippery (and sometimes smelly!) surface.
- **Hedges:** as bird nesting season is over until March next year, can any hedges or overgrown branches on your property which protrude onto pavements or roads be cut back.
- **Drainage Ditches:** If you have drainage ditches on your property, you are responsible for keeping them clear from debris (riparian duties). We are all aware of the flooding which occurs throughout our village, especially following heavy rain, so the maintenance of these ditches is extremely important.

GRACE & FLAVOUR

Grace+Flavour is the Horsley Villages' award-winning community kitchen garden. We grow a variety of vegetables, herbs, fruit and flowers. We rely on our team of dedicated volunteers to plant, sow and tend the crops. They purchase the produce based on agreed rates and their time spent in the garden. Here are a few highlights from the last 12 months. In February our head gardener, John Whitlock, received the top West Horsley Community Engagement award for his lifetime achievement. In June, West Horsley in Bloom gave us the Illiff Community award. In August we opened to the public under the National Garden Scheme, attracting 210 visitors, raising £1002 for the NGS chosen charities and £900 for Cherry Trees. WEST HORSLEY PLACE OPENS A NEW FREE SENSORY GARDEN

West Horsley Place Trust were delighted to be joined by the Mayor of Guildford, Councillor Sallie Barker, on Wednesday, September 25, to open a new sensory garden that's free for the whole community.

This peaceful and beautiful space has been designed to be as accessible as possible. To develop the garden the charity consulted a group of blind and partially blind people and members of their access panel who face a variety of different access barriers.

The design included raised beds to bring plants closer to people, colours that help create contrast and "banks of smells", as well as benches and places for sitting and reflecting.

The West Horsley Place team, which includes a dedicated group of gardening volunteers, worked for six months to transform the neglected patch of ground into a charming space. Plants were transported and propagated from the existing collection and materials were all recycled from the wider estate.

The sensory garden is a free space for everyone to enjoy. It has also been supported by Surrey Gardens Trust, West Horsley Parish Council, East Horsley Parish Council, the Stevenson Family Trust, the Banister Charity Trust, the Horsleys

Community Fund and other charitable donors.

The Trust's Director, Ilona Harris said, "We would like to thank the National Heritage Lottery Fund and our generous supporters for making this project possible. We are proud custodians of a 400-acre estate that is free for people to enjoy. It is wonderful to now have a space which is accessible and brings the benefits and beauty of that estate to everyone in our community. We hope you will come and enjoy it soon."

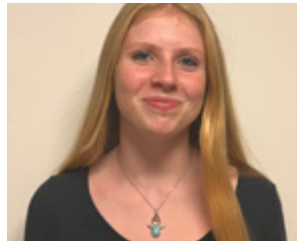

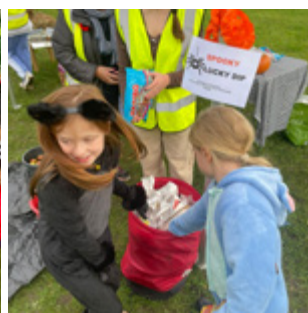
AUTUMN FAIR & MOVIE NIGHT

HENRY VIII'S FORGOTTEN PALACE

New research has revealed West Horsley Place was the haunt of Tudor pleasure-seekers and plotters, 500 years ago when this sleepy country house entertained the legendary king and his court. West Horsley Place was an out-of-town palace for the Tudor royal family. Henry VIII gifted it to his longest-lasting court favourite, Henry Courtenay, the Marquess of Exeter. The pair had been close since boyhood: Courtenay himself was of royal blood, the grandson of King Edward IV, and Henry VIII called him 'cousin'. The king not only gave the Marquess West Horsley and its hunting park he also match-made his marriage to noblewoman, Gertrude Blount. The Courtenays were the golden couple of the Tudor court; and Horsley was their playground.

The power-hungry Henry VIII would not be challenged and any who did so paid with their life. Increasingly paranoid, Henry turned on those closest to him, even his own cousin. In 1538, the Courtenays fell under suspicion of hatching a plot in Horsley to overthrow the king. They were arrested, Marquess Henry was executed, and Gertrude and her son were imprisoned in the Tower of London. The drama of their downfall features in the final novel of Hilary Mantel's Wolf Hall trilogy, *The Mirror and the Light*, now a

major BBC TV adaptation. The researchers have recovered vivid snapshots of West Horsley's colourful Tudor history, including Lady Gertrude's frantic letters attempting to explain away the suspicions of plots whispered in the house and garden, and the interviews given by household servants who told of the great and the good they saw come and go

However, best of all is an account of the happier times for the Courtenays, Henry VIII's visit in July 1533 which includes full details of the rich banquet they put on. This was a moment of the greatest triumph for the king. His marriage to Anne Boleyn had just been made public and she had been crowned queen at Westminster Abbey. Also, she was now very visibly pregnant with his heir.

The menu for the banquet still survives, listing gannet, heron, partridge, stork, stuffed rabbit, sturgeon and venison pasties among the meat dishes and blancmange, clotted cream and pistachios for pudding. The table was set with gold and silver goblets, jugs and serving plates. There was music played on the virginals and regals – portable organs – and the nine viols which the Courtenays kept for players in their Great Hall. The feast would restore the guests after their exertions hunting in West Horsley's Park.

THE D-DAY 80 PROCLAMATION CELEBRATED IN WEST HORSLEY

"Oyez, Oyez, Oyez

Today we commemorate the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings in Normandy, France an incredible achievement in military planning and logistics uniting brave service personnel from air, sea and land forces at the beginning of Operation Overlord.

By the day's end, over one hundred and fifty thousand Allied troops had successfully stormed the now famous Gold, Juno, Sword, Utah and Omaha beaches to achieve a toehold in France.

In the weeks that followed, the Allies fought bitterly against a determined foe from the unforgiving countryside of Normandy to the liberation of Paris two months later.

We should all remember and never forget the selfless sacrifice and courage of all those involved and use this Commemoration to pay our tribute to those who gave so much to secure the freedom we all enjoy today.

The flu season is here and in line with NHS directive from October we have been running flu clinics. So please, if you are eligible, book your appointment by phoning the surgery or booking an appointment online. We will also be offering COVID vaccines to those who are eligible this year. Our PPG (Patient Participation Group) have been busy putting together a newsletter for the surgery which will be available soon on our website, in reception and sent via patient access.

The Leg Club on a Thursday morning at the East Horsley Village Hall is still going well with

more patients attending. As well as wound dressings, it is providing a social environment for people to have a coffee or tea and a chat before going home. A new couch kindly provided by the Horsleys Community Fund is proving very popular with nurses and patients.

Ending on a very positive note, Horsley Medical Practice achieved 94% 'Good' for patient overall experience when attending the practice. With 104 practices in Surrey Heartlands, we came joint 8th which, as a practice, we are delighted with and will continue to try and build on this to offer the best care we can.

FRIENDS OF HORSLEY STATION

There is an ongoing project to design a 'Welcome to the Horsley's' notice board. A project has started on creating a level access to the toilet facilities. The campaign for accessibility lifts for the London bound platform is on hold pending the outcome of the Wisley New Town appeal. This has the potential to access funding from the building contractor. The former Stockyard building has been refurbished prior to being advertised to let. Friends of Horsley Station are planning a celebration event for the Triversary of the station on the 2nd February 2025.

A history of the station is being researched by Stephen Groom. Parish council members have attended a rail safety conference in Basingstoke and a community Rail conference in Woking. Both events provided good networking opportunities.



HORSLEY C.A.N. (CLIMATE ACTION NETWORK) UPDATE

The Horsley's C.A.N. group continues to network across our villages.

- In October they ran another free Community Event 'What's in our Waterways' talk from Allistair Young from The River Way Trust. More information and how to support this charity, as well as how to volunteer as a water ranger can be found here: www.riverweytrust.org.uk.
- St Martin's Church has been awarded a Silver Eco Award, St Mary's are working towards the same.
- A flood forum was held in September with representation from our bordering Parish Councils. In West Horsley a camera inspection of the culverts in Northcote Crescent confirmed they were clear. SCC are monitoring the effects of the building at Ada gardens on Heatherdene, Meadow Way and Northcote Road. SCC are also investigating in cooperation with Dene Place with respect to the water flooding in Ripley Lane.
- The climate survey is underway with 173 responses so far, we would encourage young people to take part, the closing date is 5th January 2025.

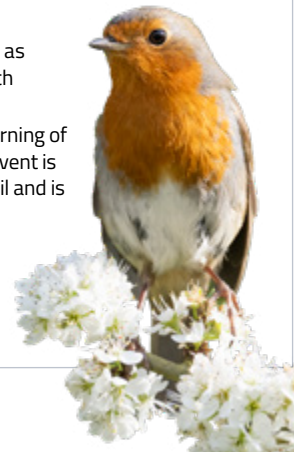
WHPC COMMUNITY GRANTS
